

Novel Spaces Library Renovations Meet Modern Community Needs

As part of its ongoing commitment to the community, the West Bloomfield Library has unveiled a series of renovations designed to meet modern needs and interests.

"Libraries have fought to maintain their relevance in the Information Age, and we're not just winning that battle—we're emerging stronger than before," said Library Director Cathy Russ.

"West Bloomfield's library has long been recognized for excellence in services, and these refreshes to underutilized spaces ensure that the library remains cutting-edge," she added.

Renovations include a high-tech Community Commons, an enchanting Storybook Trail, and a tranquil Reflection Room.

"Beyond their home and workplace, residents want another place to gather," said Russ. "For many in West Bloomfield, that place is their library. These renovations broaden the library's appeal and relevancy to wider audiences."

Residents are invited to get re-acquainted with the Main Library at an Open House on Saturday, September 21 from 12-4 PM, with special events planned in each new space.

Community Commons

The former computer lab has been transformed into the Community Commons, a multi-purpose meeting room with high-tech equipment and flexible seating.

The new space is being used for technology classes, craft workshops, and mid-size meetings, including book clubs. A technology wall boasts new maker equipment, including a laser cutter, 3D printers, Cricut, coding equipment, and more. Tweens, teens, and adults are building STEAM skills through programs that incorporate the new tools.

The Community Commons renovations were made possible through the generosity of a bequest from the Ruth S. Elbling Trust, as well as donations from the Maximovich family and friends made in memory of Dr. Alex Maximovich, a regular at the library.

"It was very important for Alex to be connected to his library," Jane Maximovich said of her husband. "His love of learning new technology, books and videos of all subject matter led me to realize that the Community Commons would be the best place for donations in his memory."



Community Commons

The room will be open to the public when not in use for programs, though equipment will be locked away for visitors' safety. The space includes a large whiteboard, two TV screens, an acoustic wall, and a mural created by artists from the Friendship Circle's Soul Studio.

"This partnership is so important for the studio," said Caitlin Cartwright, Soul Studio's community projects coordinator. "Having art in public spaces is such a booster to our artists."

There are many upcoming events scheduled for the space, including teen and adult crafts, a romance book club, an adult coding club, and technology workshops on Ancestry (a family history database), ChatGPT (an Al tool), and Canva (a graphic design website).

"I think the new space is going to be very helpful for all ages," Jane Maximovich said, "and I look forward to participating and benefiting from some of the classes that will be offered."

Kick off the Library Open House on Saturday, September 21 with a dedication of the Community Commons at 12:30 PM. Then, try demos of the new maker equipment in the Community Commons from 1-3 PM. Register for upcoming programs to learn more about the equipment.

Storybook Trail

Developed in partnership with West Bloomfield Parks, the permanent Storybook Trail features a series of story panels that guide you through a children's picture book as you walk.

"Any new way to entice people to get outside and enjoy the benefits of our green spaces is great," said WB Park Naturalist Supervisor Lauren Azoury. "It can be very rewarding to explore a new trail with your family, but bringing young ones on a trail can also come with challenges. Having a story to read to young explorers along the trail will keep them motivated to walk the whole loop and create positive memories of their outdoor experience."

The trail begins just off the Main Library's East side, adjacent to the Youth Terrace. It ends at the top of the sledding hill.

The first book featured on the new trail is *The Dinosaur in the Garden* by Deb Pilutti. To celebrate the launch of the trail, the author will attend a ribbon cutting ceremony during the Open House event.



Storybook Trail

Attend the ribbon cutting at the Library Open House on Saturday, September 21, beginning at 2 PM in the Youth Activity Center, to be among the first to walk the new trail. Enjoy a special reading and book signing from featured author Deb Pilutti and activities from WB Parks naturalists.

Reflection Room

With finishing touches completed earlier this year, the Reflection Room is a space for quiet reflection through meditation, prayer, yoga, reading, or other individual contemplation.

Formerly a quiet study room, the Reflection Room is now an inclusive and relaxing area to take a study break or calm down from overstimulation. It features comfortable floor seating, yoga mats, and rocking chairs with a view of the woods.

This renovation was funded by a generous bequest from the Ruth S. Elbling Trust. Elbling was a library board member during the Main Library's move to its current location in the early 1980s.



Reflection Room

Don't miss special mindfulness sessions in the Reflection Room during the Library Open House on Saturday, September 21, at 12:30 and 1:30 PM.

What's Next

More updates are expected to be completed this fall. A gallery wall installation is in progress in the Main Library between the fireplace and new Reflection Room. Staff hope to feature local artwork on the wall in the new year.

The Youth Terrace will also be updated with new family-oriented furniture thanks to a generous bequest from the estate of James H. Neubacher.

Additional technology and infrastructure updates are expected in the coming years to ensure the West Bloomfield Library stays ahead of the curve, as both branches near 25 years old.

Continuing Excellence: Ensuring Library Services for the Next Decade

A millage representing nearly half of the library's revenue is set to end in 2026. The Library Board of Trustees is proposing a repeal and replacement of that millage in November 2024 in anticipation of its expiration.

Why Now?

If library administrators waited until 2025, the library would incur special election costs of approximately \$100,000, per the Township Clerk's Office. Library administrators would rather put those taxpayer dollars towards providing you with great services, programs, and collections, which is why the proposal is on the November 2024 ballot.

The Proposal

The Main Library and Westacres Branch are both nearing 25 years old and will require significant infrastructure replacements over the next 10 years. Though operating expenses are stable, capital needs are driving increased expenses in 10-year financial projections.

The previous library millage was authorized at a rate of 0.6586 in 2010. The new proposal would replace this millage at a rate of 0.70 beginning in 2024 through 2033. The new rate will cost approximately \$8.92 more per \$100,000 of your home's taxable value in the first year.

What to Expect...

If a Majority Votes "Yes"

- Replacement of aging building components
- Updates to technology infrastructure, including 24/7 holds pickup lockers
- Improvements to programming areas, including the Community Meeting Room and outdoor spaces
- Expanded digital collections (eBooks, eAudiobooks, etc.)
- No need to run a special election, saving \$100,000
- Continuation of excellence in services, programs, and collections

If a Majority Votes "No"

- Cuts to programs, collections, and services, including digital collections, as publishers continue to increase costs
- Possible reduction of hours of operation to offset the cost of necessary infrastructure replacements
- The library would incur the cost of a special election in 2025

September is Library Card Signup Month


Celebrate with 3 new library card designs!



DIRECTOR'S LETTER

The West Bloomfield community has always been incredibly supportive of its library, which we appreciate beyond words. To ensure we can continue to bring you excellence in services, collections, and spaces for the next decade, the library will have a "Repeal and Replace" millage on the ballot in November.

The library has two millages: one in perpetuity and another that expires August 2026, each contributing nearly half of the library's total funding. Initially, we planned to ask for a replacement of the expiring millage in 2025. However, I recently learned that all of the elections in 2025 until August 2026 would be special elections; the cost of a special election is approximately \$100,000. The library board and administration would rather devote that money to services, collections, and programs, so we are proposing the millage on the November ballot. If approved, this millage would replace the expiring millage and be in effect until November 2033.


We are asking for a small increase of \$8.92 per \$100,000 of the taxable value of your home. For a home worth \$400,000 (taxable value \$200,000), this increase will cost just under \$18/year.

While the library's operating costs are stable and we strive to keep expenses low, both the Main Library and Westacres Branch are 24 years old and will need significant updates over the next decade. This includes replacing original building components, improving spaces, and updating technology infrastructure.




